

The Father of Lacrosse in Manhasset. "Stranny" came to town as a graduate from Union College to teach Physical Education and coach the track and football teams in 1930. In 1932, he started Manhasset HS's first Lacrosse team with games against New York Military and Peekskill Military and other schools in

RICHIE MORAN

From 1963-1965 Coach Moran set the tempo for modern day Lacrosse in Manhasset. His teams won 67 games and lost only 5. His teams in 63-64 won Long Island titles. For the past 20 years, Coach Moran has been the head coach at Cornell University and his teams have compiled a 207-56 won-lost record. He is a member of the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame. We are proud to have Coach Moran as part of our Lacrosse tradition in Manhasset.

PLAYERS...

JIM BROWN

Manhasset H.S. Varsity player for four years (1949-53).

Jim was co-captain of his teams in 52-53 and was voted the outstanding player on both of those teams. Jim played his college lacrosse at Syracuse University. Some historians of the game consider Jim to be the most dominent player the game has ever had. Jim wasn't a bad football player either. Jim is a member of the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame.

JACK HEIM \star Manhasset H.S. (1959-63).

Jack played at Manhasset for coach Moran in 1963 and led his team to the Long Island Championship with a 19-1 record. Jack was voted an all-county attackman. Jack went on to play his college lacrosse for the University of Maryland where he was named to the All-American teams in 1965-66-67. Jack later returned to Manhasset and coached in the PBC program. Jack was voted to the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame this year.

JOHN CARDILLO * Manhasset H.S. (1961-65).

John played defense for Coach Moran and received All-County honors in 1965. John played his college Lacross at Johns Hopkins University where he was an All-American defenseman in 1967-68-69. John later returned to Manhasset to serve as an intramural coach, a traveling team coach, and commissioner of the PBC program.

ROBERT HENRICKSON ★ Manhasset H.S. (1970-74).

Robert played lacrosse for Manhasset in 72-73-74 winning All-American honors in 1974. Robert Played his collegiate lacrosse at Cornell University for Coach Moran. He was selected as a member of the 1976-77-78 All American teams and named ollegiate Mid-Fielder of the year in 1978. He was a representative on the USA Team in 1978 and again in '82.

SCOTT BAUGHER \star Manhasset H.S. (1970-74).

Scott played varsity lacrosse for Manhasset H.S. in 1972-73-74 and was a High School All-American selection in 74. Scott played his collegiate lacrosse at Johns Hopkins University and was an All-American mid-fielder in 1977-78-79.

JOHN DRISCOLL * Manhasset H.S. (1972-76).

John played varsity lacrosse in 74-75-76 and was a High School All-American selection in 1975. He played his college lacrosse at the University of Virginia where he was an All-American selection in 1979-80. John was also a member of the USA team in 1982 and 1986. He is currently a member of the NY Saints.
